
SPREADING RIPPLES

Professor David Kuske (1934–2022)

Professor David Kuske, who finished his journey to heaven on October 29, 2022, served the church in many ways. During his ministry he was involved in education at various levels. Working to improve teaching and instructional methods was one of his chief interests. He contributed to the self studies of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary especially in the area of curriculum review. Hermeneutics and New Testament were two of his prime areas of teaching. The textual criticism of the New Testament was one of his specialties. He was an early advocate for producing a Lutheran translation of the Bible. He and Siegbert Becker participated in translation efforts sponsored by groups within the Missouri Synod. He encouraged the Wisconsin Synod to undertake the work as a synodical project. In his written proposal for the project he envisioned it as a fifteen year undertaking. When the undertaking became a private effort of the Wartburg Project, he energetically lent his assistance to the project as a volunteer during his retirement years. He lived to see the completion of the EHV Bible and Study Bible in a project that lasted seven years. We are thankful for all his service to the church. Now he rests from his labors.

It was a blessing to us from our gracious God that Professor David Kuske was able to work together with us in producing the EHV Bible and EHV Study Bible. Professor Kuske taught New Testament Greek exegesis at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, where he also taught some members of our translation team. He taught careful attention to the words of the text. He taught us how to consider and evaluate all witnesses to the New Testament text without showing favoritism for just a few witnesses in a certain area of the world.



He worked through the entire Greek New Testament for the EHV offering many suggestions on evaluating the Greek manuscripts. His insights in this area incorporated the experience of WLS professors who taught before him and with him. All of this work was considered in the making of the EHV translation.

When the EHV was still just a draft translation, he worked through the entire New Testament text of these draft translations, offering technical reviews and many valuable suggestions. Again, he shared some of the insights of his predecessors and colleagues at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary.

He also helped with writing suggestions and working through all of the New Testament study notes of the EHV Study Bible. He supplied many useful suggestions and comments for us to consider.

He did an enormous amount of work on the EHV New Testament text and study notes. His input was very valuable to us. He was a humble and faithful servant of Christ. Often his helpful encouragements arrived at just the right time when they were most needed as we were editing the New Testament. When the translation was finished and published, he encouraged others to consider using the EHV.

Several members of our New Testament team recently mentioned that Professor Kuske's efforts and work continue to live on in the EHV. It was our privilege to learn from him as students and to work with him on the EHV. We praise our gracious Savior for blessing David Kuske with "patient endurance" and giving him the gift of eternal life. We pray that our Lord Jesus will comfort his family and all who mourn with his comforting promises.

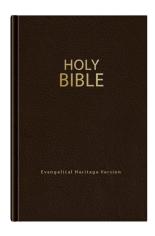


