Grass withers, flowers fade, but the Word of our God endures forever. Translators come, translations go, but the Word of our God endures forever.


The translation of the minor prophets has been completed and we are in the last stages of technical review. The proofreading of the NPH printouts of the Old Testament has reached Song of Songs. NPH has laid out all of the Old Testament text through Daniel.

## 2017 Preview Edition


The 2017 Reformation Anniversary Edition of the EHV New Testament and Psalms has been on sale for about three months now and distribution is going well. In addition to individual orders, a number of volume orders have been made for congregations and other groups, many of them sponsored by donors who are making gifts of the EHV to others. Kindle and Nook versions are available from Amazon and Barnes and Noble. We are continuing delivery of review copies to various periodicals, schools, and organizations.

**NPH** is preparing for a second printing. We are aware of only three typos in the New Testament and Psalms. They are:

- Matthew 5:16 The verse number needs to be superscript.
- Luke 19:27 Insert "of" before "me."
- 1 Thessalonians 2:7 The **footnote** needs an "s" on "infants."



How soon the EHV appears on the Bible Gateway site depends on their set-up process. We have been told EHV is in the queue for their developers.



## **Derived Works**

If you are working on a project for which you would like to use the EHV, no permission is needed to use up to 1000 verses, unless the selection includes whole books of the Bible. For all other uses, licenses are available on favorable terms.

If you would like to see a product based on the EHV, contact WP if we would be the expected publisher of the product, but if the expected publisher would be a publishing house, or a producer of Bible software, express your interest in the product to the potential producer (for example, to LOGOS). The more market interest there is, the sooner a product appears.

We have been receiving requests to use the EHV for memory passage lists for all ages of children. We are a happy to give permission for such lists. No permission is needed for lists that use fewer than 1000 passages.

We have prepared lists of EHV Bible verses for those who use the Memory Treasures books (K-8). These are being posted on our website.

## The EHV Study Bible

Planning and initial work on the EHV Study Bible is underway, including the gathering of maps and charts. This work will step up later this fall. Our current idea concerning the initial format is for an electronic Bible in landscape format, with the left side of the screen Biblical text and the right side of the screen scrolling notes. Maps and charts will be links to pop-ups. If you have suggestions for software or programming to implement this plan or if you have better ideas, we will be happy to hear them.

# **Lectionaries Update**

The lectionaries for the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 church years will again be made available to congregations free of charge. The first parts of the 2017-2018 lectionaries should be posted soon. The lectionaries produced by WP include all the lectionaries commonly used in WELS and the LCMS. WP is willing to grant permission to use EHV to the producers of other lectionary systems.

# Excerpt from FAQ 37 — Hey, Do You Want to Buy Water?

In Isaiah 55:1 the EHV says, "Hey, all of you who are thirsty, come to the water." Many other translations say, "Come, all of you who are thirsty, come to the water." Isn't "hey" too slangy? What is wrong with "Come"?

Here is the full EHV translation with its footnote:

"Hey,¹ all of you who are thirsty, come to the water, even if you have no money!

Come, buy and eat!

Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost.

Footnote: ¹The English word hey expresses the same urgency as the Hebrew word hoi. It is the cry of the street vendor who is eager to sell his wares.

The first Hebrew word in Isaiah 55 is not the Hebrew word for "come" which is used three times later in the verse. The Hebrew word here is *hoi*, which is not a verb but an exclamation that even sounds like the English exclamation *hey*, so the EHV rendering is following a literal understanding of the Hebrew word *hoi* and differentiating it from the three instances of *come* that follow later in the verse. ...

The imagery of the text is that of a street vendor, urging the crowd to buy his wares. Though we did not have this example in mind when we translated Isaiah, a recent visit to Miller Park in Milwaukee, demonstrated that *hey* is the right choice here. ...
