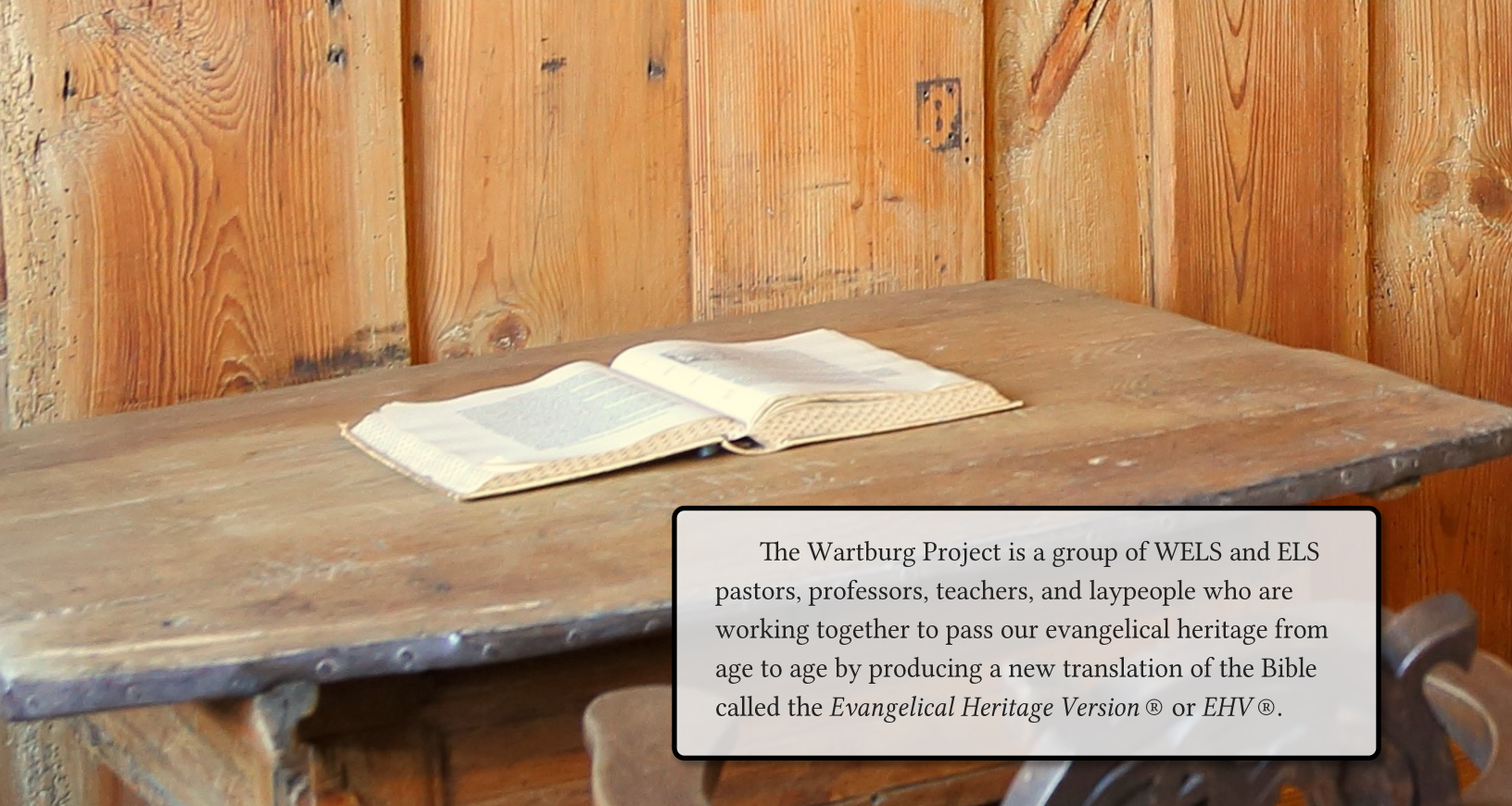

A SUITE OF EHV RESOURCES FOR CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Available just in time for Christmas gifts

The EHV is gradually assembling a suite of resources for Christian education. The most essential resource, of course, is the basic print pew Bible and classroom Bible available from Northwestern Publishing House. The EHV version of the WELS catechism is also available from NPH. The EHV is also used in the ELS catechism and is available for use in other catechisms.

The newest addition to the suite is the *Story of God's Love*, a Bible history book which is more than a Bible history book. It introduces students to all sixty-six books of the Bible. Because of its importance and many uses, it has its own featured article below (Resource 1).

EHV electronic study Bibles have been available for some time now in Microsoft Store and in Logos Editions. These Bibles are also available in editions that use metric measurements for readers in other countries that use the metric system (Resources 2 and 3). These editions are now joined by a print edition of the EHV Study Bible from NPH (Resource 4).

Teachers may use the EHV in their resources without seeking permission if a specific product uses fewer than 1000 verses and does not include whole books of the Bible, and the EHV text does not make up more than 50% of the content of the resource. However, we readily grant free permission for products that exceed these limits for resources like catechisms, commentaries, etc.

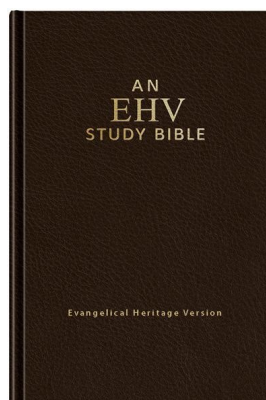
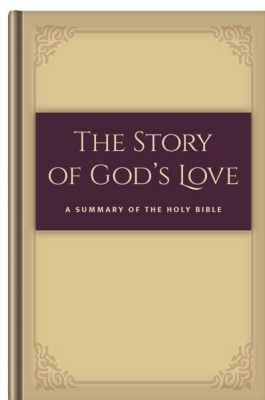
Teachers are producing their own resources that use the EHV, such as lists of memory passages, class lessons, and so on. We encourage teachers to share such resources with their colleagues.

An EHV Study Bible: Introduction to Kings

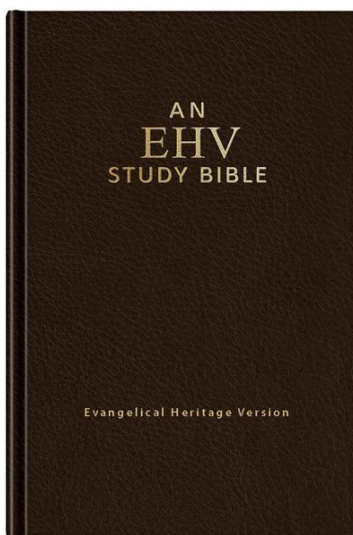
This is a sample draft of the introduction to Kings in the study Bibles.
