Spreading Ripples

In this section of the news we regularly report new uses of the EHV. Creators of works can use up to 1000 verses of the EHV per work without permission, and we are generous in giving permission for works that go beyond this. We are especially thinking of works like commentaries, devotional books, catechisms, lectionaries, Bible history books, and Bible classes. But we also give permission for works that use much less text: musical compositions, artworks, greetings cards, etc. To our knowledge, this is the first time we have given permission for a game. Bibordle, a game like Wordle, uses the EHV as its default translation with the KJV as an alternate. You can check it out by searching Bibordle or using this link: https://bibordle.web.app The game chooses a random word from the EHV to guess, and then at the end it displays a random verse with that word in it, whether or not the player solves the puzzle.




