

SPREADING RIPPLES

The spreading ripples of the EHV include use outside of our own circles. Last year we gave a mission organization in Hong Kong permission to print and distribute free copies of John and Luke's gospels to Muslims in Hong Kong and the UK. They printed 5000 copies, 3500 for distribution in Hong Kong and 1500 for the UK. They recently sent us pictures of their distribution of EHV gospels in Hong Kong. Muslims in Hong Kong include legal residents, asylum seekers, illegal residents, and domestic workers. Up to 200,000 Indonesians are employed in Hong Kong, and thousands more come from Pakistan and other Muslim countries.

Sites for distribution of the gospels include mosques at the time of Friday prayers and a type of gathering that one often notices in Hong Kong on weekends: expatriate communities, such as Indonesian and Filipino domestic workers, meet together on weekends, often under overpasses or porticos near parks. This provides an opportunity to contact many people with the gospel.

Among the reasons that the group mentions for choosing EHV for their project are that it is "a fairly literal-but-readable good modern English translation and it also follows the 'majority text' rather than most modern Bibles' following of the 'Alexandrian readings'. Among other things the important passages of John 7:53-8:11 and Mark 16:9-20 are included without any qualification." Perhaps the major factor is that the EHV does not charge any royalties or fees for free distributions of the Gospels.






