## First Lesson

### Isaiah 59:12-20

<sup>12</sup>Yes, our rebellious deeds are many before you,  
and our sins testify against us.

Our rebellious deeds are with us,  
and as for our guilty deeds, we know them:

<sup>13</sup>rebellion and treachery against the LORD,  
and we turn back from following our God.

We incite oppression and apostasy.

We conceive and utter deceitful words from our heart.

<sup>14</sup>Justice is turned back,  
and righteousness stands far away,  
for truth stumbles in the city square,  
and uprightness cannot enter.

<sup>15</sup>Truth is missing  
and the one who turns aside from evil becomes prey.  
The LORD saw that there was no justice,  
and it was evil in his sight.

<sup>16</sup>He saw that there was no man,  
and he was appalled that there was no intercessor.  
So his own arm worked salvation for him,  
and his own righteousness supported him.

<sup>17</sup>So he clothed himself with righteousness like body armor,  
and with a helmet of salvation on his head.

He clothed himself in garments of vengeance,  
and he wrapped himself with zeal like a cloak.

<sup>18</sup>He will repay in full what they have earned:  
wrath to his foes, full payment to his enemies.  
He will repay even the distant islands.

<sup>19</sup>From the west they will fear the LORD's name,  
and from the rising of the sun they will fear his glory,  
for he will come like a raging river,  
driven by the Spirit of the LORD.

<sup>20</sup>Then a Redeemer will come for Zion,  
for those in Jacob who turn from rebellion,  
—the declaration of the LORD.

## Second Lesson

### 2 Corinthians 5:17-6:2

<sup>17</sup>So then, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away. The new has come! <sup>18</sup>And all these things are from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation. <sup>19</sup>That is, God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them. And he has entrusted to us the message of reconciliation. <sup>20</sup>Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, inasmuch as God is making an appeal through us. We urge you, on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup>God made him, who did not know sin, to become sin for us, so that we might become the righteousness of God in him.

<sup>6:1</sup>As fellow workers we also urge you not to receive God's grace in vain. <sup>2</sup>For he says:

At a favorable time I listened to you,  
and in the day of salvation I helped you.

Look, now is the favorable time! See, now is the day of salvation!

## Gospel

### Luke 7:36-50

<sup>36</sup>A certain one of the Pharisees asked Jesus to eat with him. Jesus entered the Pharisee's house and reclined at the table. <sup>37</sup>Just then a sinful woman from that town learned that he was reclining in the Pharisee's house. She brought an alabaster jar of perfume, <sup>38</sup>stood behind him near his feet weeping, and began to wet his feet with her tears. Then she began to wipe them with her hair while also kissing his feet and anointing them with the perfume. <sup>39</sup>When the Pharisee who had invited him saw this, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would realize who is touching him and what kind of woman she is, because she is a sinner."

<sup>40</sup>Jesus answered him, "Simon, I have something to tell you."

He said, "Teacher, say it."

<sup>41</sup>"A certain moneylender had two debtors. The one owed five hundred denarii, and the other fifty. <sup>42</sup>When they could not pay, he forgave them both. So, which of them will love him more?"

<sup>43</sup>Simon answered, "I suppose the one who had the larger debt forgiven."

Then he told him, "You have judged correctly." <sup>44</sup>Turning toward the woman, he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house, but you did not give me water for my feet. Yet she has wet my feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. <sup>45</sup>You did not give me a kiss, but she, from the time I entered, has not stopped kissing my feet. <sup>46</sup>You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with perfume. <sup>47</sup>Therefore I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven; that is why she loved so much. But the one who is forgiven little loves little." <sup>48</sup>Then Jesus said to her, "Your sins have been forgiven."

<sup>49</sup>Those reclining at the table with him began to say among themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?"

<sup>50</sup>He said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you. Go in peace."

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# The First Sunday in Lent

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## First Lesson

### Genesis 3:1-15

<sup>1</sup>Now the serpent was more clever than any wild animal which the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, “Has God really said, ‘You shall not eat from any tree in the garden?’”

<sup>2</sup>The woman said to the serpent, “We may eat fruit from the trees of the garden, <sup>3</sup>but not from the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden. God has said, ‘You shall not eat from it. You shall not touch it, or else you will die.’”

<sup>4</sup>The serpent said to the woman, “You certainly will not die. <sup>5</sup>In fact, God knows that the day you eat from it, your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.”

<sup>6</sup>When the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was appealing to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable to make one wise, she took some of its fruit and ate. She gave some also to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. <sup>7</sup>The eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized that they were naked. They sewed fig leaves together and made coverings for their waists. <sup>8</sup>They heard the voice of the LORD God, who was walking around in the garden during the cooler part of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden.

<sup>9</sup>The LORD God called to the man and said to him, “Where are you?”

<sup>10</sup>The man said, “I heard your voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked, so I hid myself.”

<sup>11</sup>God said, “Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree from which I commanded you not to eat?”

<sup>12</sup>The man said, “The woman you gave to be with me—she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate it.”

<sup>13</sup>The LORD God said to the woman, “What have you done?”

The woman said, “The serpent deceived me, and I ate.”

<sup>14</sup>The LORD God said to the serpent:

Because you have done this,  
you are cursed more than all the livestock,  
and more than every wild animal.  
You shall crawl on your belly,  
and you shall eat dust all the days of your life.

<sup>15</sup>I will put hostility between you and the woman,  
and between your seed and her seed.  
He will crush your head,  
and you will crush his heel.

## Second Lesson

### 2 Corinthians 6:1-10

As fellow workers we also urge you not to receive God's grace in vain. <sup>2</sup>For he says:

At a favorable time I listened to you,  
and in the day of salvation I helped you.

Look, now is the favorable time! See, now is the day of salvation!

<sup>3</sup>We are giving no one a reason to stumble in any way, so that our ministry will not be blamed.

<sup>4</sup>Rather, in every way we show ourselves to be God's ministers: in great endurance, in troubles, in hardships, in difficulties, <sup>5</sup>in beatings, in imprisonments, in riots, in hard work, in sleepless nights, in times of hunger; <sup>6</sup>in purity, in knowledge, in patience, in kindness, in the Holy Spirit, in sincere love, <sup>7</sup>in the word of truth, in the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness on the right and on the left; <sup>8</sup>through glory and dishonor, through bad report and good report; treated as deceivers yet being honest, <sup>9</sup>treated as unknown and yet being well known; as dying, and yet look—we live; as punished yet not put to death; <sup>10</sup>as grieving yet always rejoicing; as poor yet making many rich; as having nothing yet possessing everything.

## Gospel

### Matthew 4:1-11

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the Devil. <sup>2</sup>After he had fasted forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. <sup>3</sup>The Tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become bread."

<sup>4</sup>But Jesus answered, "It is written:

Man shall not live by bread alone,  
but by every word that comes out of the mouth of God."

<sup>5</sup>Then the Devil took him into the holy city. He placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, <sup>6</sup>and he said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down. For it is written:

He will command his angels concerning you.  
And they will lift you up in their hands,  
so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."

<sup>7</sup>Jesus said to him, "Again, it is written:

You shall not test the Lord your God."

<sup>8</sup>Again the Devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. <sup>9</sup>He said to him, "I will give you all of these things, if you will bow down and worship me."

<sup>10</sup>Then Jesus said to him, "Go away, Satan! For it is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'"

<sup>11</sup>Then the Devil left him, and just then angels came and served him.

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# The Second Sunday in Lent

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## First Lesson

### Isaiah 49:5-9a

<sup>5</sup>But now the LORD  
who formed me from the womb to be his servant,  
to turn Jacob back to him,  
so that Israel might be gathered to him,  
so that I will be honored in the eyes of the LORD,  
and my God has become my strength—

<sup>6</sup>the LORD said,  
“It is too small a thing that you should be my servant  
to raise up the tribes of Jacob  
and to restore the ones I have kept in Israel,  
so I will appoint you to be a light for the nations  
so that my salvation may be known to the end of the earth.”

<sup>7</sup>This is what the LORD, the Redeemer of Israel, its Holy One,  
says to the one deeply despised,  
to one abhorred by the nation,  
to the servant of rulers:

“Kings will see and stand up.  
Public officials will see,  
and they will bow down,  
because of the LORD, who is faithful,  
because of the Holy One of Israel, who has chosen you.”

<sup>8</sup>This is what the LORD says:

“In the time of favor, I am answering you.  
In the day of salvation, I am helping you.  
I will guard you,  
and I will appoint you to be a covenant for the people,  
to establish the land,  
to distribute desolate heritages as a possession,  
<sup>9</sup>to say to the prisoners, ‘Go forth!’  
to those who are in the darkness, ‘Show yourselves!’”

## Second Lesson

### 1 Thessalonians 4:1-7

Therefore, beyond this, brothers, just as you received instruction from us about how you are to walk so as to please God (as indeed you are doing), we ask and urge you in the Lord Jesus that you do so even more. <sup>2</sup>To be sure, you know what instructions we gave you through the Lord Jesus. <sup>3</sup>Indeed, this is God's will: that you be sanctified, namely, that you keep yourselves away from sexual immorality. <sup>4</sup>He wants each of you to learn to obtain a wife for yourself in a way that is holy and honorable, <sup>5</sup>not in lustful passion like the heathen, who do not know God. <sup>6</sup>No one is to overstep and take advantage of his brother in this matter, because the Lord is an avenger in all these things, just as we said previously and solemnly testified to it. <sup>7</sup>For God did not call us for uncleanness, but in sanctification.

## Gospel

### Matthew 15:21-28

<sup>21</sup>Jesus left that place and withdrew into the region of Tyre and Sidon. <sup>22</sup>There a Canaanite woman from that territory came and kept crying out, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David! A demon is severely tormenting my daughter!"

<sup>23</sup>But he did not answer her a word.

His disciples came and pleaded, "Send her away, because she keeps crying out after us."

<sup>24</sup>He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel."

<sup>25</sup>But she came and knelt in front of him, saying, "Lord, help me."

<sup>26</sup>He answered her, "It is not good to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs."

<sup>27</sup>"Yes, Lord," she said, "yet the dogs also eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

<sup>28</sup>Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, your faith is great! It will be done for you, just as you desire." And her daughter was healed at that very hour.

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# The Third Sunday in Lent

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## First Lesson

### 2 Samuel 22:1-7

David spoke the words of this song to the LORD on the day when the LORD had delivered him from the grasp of all his enemies, even from the grasp of Saul. <sup>2</sup>He said:

<sup>2</sup>The LORD is my rocky cliff, my stronghold, and my deliverer.

<sup>3</sup>My God is my rock. I take refuge in him.

He is my shield and the horn of my salvation,  
my high fortress, my refuge, and my savior.

You save me from violence.

<sup>4</sup>I call to the LORD, who is worthy of praise,  
and I am saved from my enemies.

<sup>5</sup>The waves of death swirled around me.

Floodwaters of destruction rolled over me.

<sup>6</sup>The ropes of the grave wrapped around me.

The traps of death threatened me.

<sup>7</sup>In my distress I called to the LORD.

To my God I cried out.

He heard my voice from his temple.

My cry for help reached his ears.

## Second Lesson

### Ephesians 5:1-9

Therefore, be imitators of God as his dearly loved children. <sup>2</sup>And walk in love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself for us, as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

<sup>3</sup>But do not let sexual immorality, any kind of impurity, or greed even be mentioned among you, as is proper for saints. <sup>4</sup>Obscenity, foolish talk, and coarse joking are also out of place. Instead, give thanks. <sup>5</sup>Certainly you are aware of this: No immoral, impure, or greedy person—such a person is an idolater—has an inheritance in the kingdom of Christ, who is God. <sup>6</sup>Let no one deceive you with empty words. It is because of these things that the wrath of God is coming on the sons of disobedience. <sup>7</sup>So do not share in what they do.

<sup>8</sup>For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light, <sup>9</sup>for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness, and truth.

# Gospel

## Luke 11:14-28

<sup>14</sup>Jesus drove out a demon, which was mute. After the demon had gone out, the man who had been mute spoke, and the crowds were amazed. <sup>15</sup>But some of them said, “He drives out demons by Beelzebul, the ruler of the demons.” <sup>16</sup>Others were testing him by demanding of him a sign from heaven. <sup>17</sup>But he knew their thoughts and said to them, “Every kingdom divided against itself is destroyed. And a house divided against itself falls. <sup>18</sup>If Satan is divided against himself, how will his kingdom stand? You say that I drive out demons by Beelzebul. <sup>19</sup>But if I drive out demons by Beelzebul, by whom do your sons drive them out? So they will be your judges. <sup>20</sup>Yet if I drive out demons by the finger of God, then the kingdom of God has come upon you.

<sup>21</sup>“When a strong man, fully armed, guards his own house, his possessions are safe. <sup>22</sup>But when someone stronger attacks him and defeats him, he takes away that man’s full armor, in which he had trusted, and divides up his plunder.

<sup>23</sup>“The one who is not with me is against me. The one who does not gather with me scatters. <sup>24</sup>When an unclean spirit goes out of a man, it passes through waterless places, seeking rest, but does not find any. Then it says, ‘I will return to my house, the one I left.’ <sup>25</sup>When it returns, it finds the house swept and put in order. <sup>26</sup>Then it goes and brings seven other spirits more evil than itself, and they go in and dwell there. The last condition of that man becomes worse than the first.”

<sup>27</sup>While he was saying these things, a woman from the crowd raised her voice and said to him, “Blessed is the womb that carried you, and the breasts at which you nursed!”

<sup>28</sup>But he said, “Even more blessed are those who hear the word of God and keep it.”

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# The Fourth Sunday in Lent

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## First Lesson

### Exodus 16:11-17

<sup>11</sup>The LORD spoke to Moses: <sup>12</sup>“I have heard the grumbling of the Israelites. Say to them, ‘At evening you will eat meat, and in the morning you will eat bread until you are full. Then you will know that I am the LORD your God.’”

<sup>13</sup>So in the evening quail came and covered the camp, and in the morning a layer of dew surrounded the camp. <sup>14</sup>When the layer of dew was gone, there were thin flakes on the surface of the wilderness, thin as frost on the ground. <sup>15</sup>When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, “What is it?” because they did not know what it was.

Moses said to them, “This is the bread which the LORD has given to you as food to eat. <sup>16</sup>This is what the LORD has commanded: All of them are to gather as much of it as they need to eat. You are to take an omer per person based on the number of people each of you has in your tents.”

<sup>17</sup>The Israelites did this, and some gathered more, some less.

## Second Lesson

### Ephesians 3:14-20

<sup>14</sup>For this reason I kneel before the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, <sup>15</sup>from whom the entire family in heaven and on earth receives its name. <sup>16</sup>I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he would strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner self, <sup>17</sup>so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. Then, being rooted and grounded in love, <sup>18</sup>I pray that you would be able to comprehend, along with all the saints, how wide and long and high and deep his love is, <sup>19</sup>and that you would be able to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled to all the fullness of God.

<sup>20</sup>Now to him, who is able, according to the power that is at work within us, to do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine...

## Gospel

### John 6:1-15

After this, Jesus crossed over to the other side of the Sea of Galilee (or Tiberias). <sup>2</sup>A large crowd followed him because they saw the miraculous signs he was performing on those who were sick. <sup>3</sup>Jesus went up on the hillside and sat down there with his disciples. <sup>4</sup>The Jewish Passover Festival was near.

<sup>5</sup>When Jesus looked up and saw a huge crowd coming toward him, he asked Philip, “Where can we buy bread for these people to eat?” <sup>6</sup>But Jesus was saying this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do.

<sup>7</sup>Philip answered him, “Two hundred denarii worth of bread would not be enough for each of them to have just a little.”

<sup>8</sup>One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, <sup>9</sup>"There's a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish, but what is that for so many people?"

<sup>10</sup>Jesus said, "Have the people sit down." There was plenty of grass in that place, so they sat down. There were about five thousand men.

<sup>11</sup>Then Jesus took the loaves and, after giving thanks, he distributed pieces to those who were seated. He also did the same with the fish—as much as they wanted.

<sup>12</sup>When the people were full, he told his disciples, "Gather the pieces that are left over so that nothing is wasted." <sup>13</sup>So they gathered them and filled twelve baskets with pieces from the five barley loaves left over by those who had eaten.

<sup>14</sup>When the people saw the miraculous sign Jesus did, they said, "This really is the Prophet who is coming into the world."

<sup>15</sup>When Jesus realized that they intended to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

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# The Fifth Sunday in Lent

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## First Lesson

### Exodus 3:1-15

Now Moses was shepherding the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, a priest of Midian, and he led the flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. <sup>2</sup>The Angel of the LORD appeared to him in blazing fire from within a bush. Moses saw that the bush was on fire, but the bush was not burning up. <sup>3</sup>So he said, “I will go over and look at this amazing sight—to find out why the bush is not burning up.”

<sup>4</sup>When the LORD saw that Moses had gone over to take a look, God called to him from the middle of the bush and said, “Moses! Moses!”

Moses said, “I am here.”

<sup>5</sup>The LORD said, “Do not come any closer. Take your sandals off your feet, for the place where you are standing is holy ground.” <sup>6</sup>He then said, “I am the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob.”

Moses hid his face, because he was afraid to look at God.

<sup>7</sup>The LORD said, “I have certainly seen the misery of my people in Egypt, and I have heard their cry for help because of their slave drivers. Yes, I am aware of their suffering. <sup>8</sup>So I have come down to deliver them from the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land to a good and spacious land, to a land flowing with milk and honey, to the place of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. <sup>9</sup>Now indeed, the Israelites’ cry for help has come to me. Yes, I have seen how the Egyptians are oppressing them. <sup>10</sup>Come now, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt.”

<sup>11</sup>But Moses said to God, “Who am I, that I should go to Pharaoh, and that I should bring the Israelites out of Egypt?”

<sup>12</sup>So he said, “I will certainly be with you. This will be the sign to you that I have sent you: When you have brought the people out of Egypt, you will serve God on this mountain.”

<sup>13</sup>But Moses said to God, “If I go to the Israelites and say to them, ‘The God of your fathers has sent me to you,’ and they ask me, ‘What is his name?’ what should I say to them?”

<sup>14</sup>So God replied to Moses, “I AM WHO I AM.” He also said, “You will say this to the Israelites: I AM has sent me to you.”

<sup>15</sup>God also told Moses, “Say this to the Israelites: ‘The LORD, the God of your fathers—the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob—has sent me to you. This is my name forever, and this is how I am to be remembered from generation to generation.’”

## Second Lesson

### Hebrews 9:11-15

<sup>11</sup>But when Christ appeared as the high priest of the good things that were coming, he went through the greater and more complete tent, which was not made by human hands (that is, it is not part of this creation). <sup>12</sup>He entered once into the Most Holy Place and obtained eternal redemption, not by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood. <sup>13</sup>Now if the blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer, sprinkled on those who were unclean, sanctifies them so that their flesh is clean, <sup>14</sup>how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works, so that we worship the living God?

<sup>15</sup>For this reason, he is the mediator of a new covenant. A death took place as payment for the trespasses committed under the first covenant, so that those who are called would receive the promised eternal inheritance.

## Gospel

### John 8:46-59

<sup>46</sup>“Who of you can convict me of sin? If I am telling the truth, why don’t you believe me? <sup>47</sup>Whoever belongs to God listens to what God says. The reason you do not listen is that you do not belong to God.”

<sup>48</sup>The Jews responded, “Are we not right in saying that you are a Samaritan and have a demon?”

<sup>49</sup>Jesus answered, “I do not have a demon. On the contrary, I honor my Father, and you dishonor me. <sup>50</sup>I do not seek my own glory. There is one who seeks it, and he is the judge. <sup>51</sup>Amen, Amen,<sup>a</sup> I tell you: If anyone holds on to my word, he will certainly never see death.”

<sup>52</sup>So the Jews said to him, “Now we know that you have a demon. Abraham died, and so did the prophets. Yet you say, ‘If anyone holds on to my word, he will certainly never taste death.’ <sup>53</sup>You are not greater than our father, Abraham, are you? He died. And the prophets died. Who do think you are?”

<sup>54</sup>Jesus answered, “If I glorify myself, my glory is nothing. It is my Father who glorifies me, about whom you say, ‘He is our God.’ <sup>55</sup>Yet you do not really know him, but I do know him. If I said, ‘I do not know him,’ I would be a liar like you. But I do know him, and I hold on to his word. <sup>56</sup>Your father Abraham was glad that he would see my day. He saw it and rejoiced.”

<sup>57</sup>The Jews replied, “You aren’t even fifty years old, and you have seen Abraham?”

<sup>58</sup>Jesus said to them, “Amen, Amen, I tell you: Before Abraham was born, I am.” <sup>59</sup>Then they picked up stones to throw at him. But Jesus was hidden and left the temple area.

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<sup>a</sup> Usually, people say Amen at the end of a prayer. But Jesus used this Hebrew word at the beginning of a statement, which was unique. The inspired writer simply transliterated the Hebrew word that Jesus spoke, instead of using a Greek term. This translation does the same in English. ## First Lesson

### **Zechariah 9:9-12**

Rejoice greatly, Daughter of Zion!

Shout, Daughter of Jerusalem!

Look! Your King is coming to you.

He is righteous and brings salvation.

He is humble and riding on a donkey,  
on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

<sup>10</sup>I will cut off the chariot from Ephraim  
and the horse from Jerusalem.

The battle bow will be taken away,  
and he will proclaim peace to the nations.

His kingdom will extend from sea to sea,  
from the River to the ends of the earth.

<sup>11</sup>As for you,  
because of the blood of my covenant with you

I will release your prisoners from the waterless pit.

<sup>12</sup>Return to the stronghold, you prisoners who have hope.  
This very day I declare that I will restore double to you.

## Second Lesson

### **Philippians 2:5-11**

<sup>5</sup>Indeed, let this attitude be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus. <sup>6</sup>Though he was by nature God, he did not consider equality with God as a prize to be displayed, <sup>7</sup>but he emptied himself by taking the nature of a servant. When he was born in human likeness, and his appearance was like that of any other man, <sup>8</sup>he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. <sup>9</sup>Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, <sup>10</sup>so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, <sup>11</sup>and every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

## Gospel

### **Matthew 21:1-9**

As they approached Jerusalem and came to Bethphage on the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, <sup>2</sup>telling them, “Go to the village ahead of you. Immediately you will find a donkey tied there along with her colt. Untie them and bring them to me. <sup>3</sup>If anyone says anything to you, you are to say, ‘The Lord needs them,’ and he will send them at once.”

<sup>4</sup>This took place to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet:

<sup>5</sup>Tell the daughter of Zion: Look, your King comes to you, humble, and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

<sup>6</sup>The disciples went and did just as Jesus commanded them. <sup>7</sup>They brought the donkey and the colt, laid their outer clothing on them, and he sat on it. <sup>8</sup>A very large crowd spread their outer clothing on the road. Others were cutting branches from the trees and spreading them out on the road. <sup>9</sup>The crowds who went in front of him and those who followed kept shouting,

Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest!

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# Maundy Thursday

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## First Lesson

### Exodus 12:1-14

The LORD told Moses and Aaron this in the land of Egypt:

<sup>2</sup>This month is to be the beginning of your calendar. It is to be the first month of the year for you. <sup>3</sup>Tell the entire Israelite community that on the tenth day of this month, they are to take a lamb or a kid goat for themselves, according to their fathers' households, one lamb per household. <sup>4</sup>But if the household is too small for a whole lamb, then that person and his neighbor next door to him must select one, based on the number of people. Determine what size lamb is needed according to how much each person will eat.

<sup>5</sup>Your lamb must be unblemished, a year-old male. You may take it from the sheep or the goats. <sup>6</sup>You are to keep it until the fourteenth day of this month. Then the whole assembly of the Israelite community is to slaughter the lambs at sunset. <sup>7</sup>They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses where they eat the lamb. <sup>8</sup>That night they shall eat the meat that has been roasted over a fire, along with unleavened bread. They shall eat it with bitter herbs. <sup>9</sup>Do not eat it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over a fire—with its head, its legs, and its internal organs. <sup>10</sup>You shall not leave any of it until the morning. Whatever remains until the morning, you shall burn in the fire. <sup>11</sup>This is how you are to eat it: with your cloak tucked into your belt ready for travel, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. Eat it in haste. It is the LORD's Passover.

<sup>12</sup>For on that night I will pass through the land of Egypt. I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both people and animals. Against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment. I am the LORD. <sup>13</sup>The blood will be a sign for you on the houses where you are. When I see the blood, I will pass over you. There will be no plague among you to destroy you, when I strike down the land of Egypt.

<sup>14</sup>This day shall be a memorial for you, and you are to celebrate it as a festival to the LORD. Throughout your generations you must celebrate it as a permanent regulation.

## Second Lesson

### 1 Corinthians 11:23-32

<sup>23</sup>For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you: The Lord Jesus, on the night when he was betrayed, took bread, <sup>24</sup>and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." <sup>25</sup>In the same way, after the meal, he also took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new testament in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." <sup>26</sup>For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

<sup>27</sup>Therefore whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of sinning against the Lord's body and blood. <sup>28</sup>Instead, let a person examine himself and after

doing so, let him eat of the bread and drink from the cup. <sup>29</sup>For if anyone eats and drinks in an unworthy way because he does not recognize the Lord's body, he eats and drinks judgment on himself. <sup>30</sup>Because of this, many among you are weak and sick, and quite a few have fallen asleep. <sup>31</sup>But if we judged ourselves, we would not be undergoing judgment. <sup>32</sup>However, when we undergo judgment, we are being disciplined by the Lord so that we may not be condemned with the world.

## Gospel

### John 13:1-15

Before the Passover Festival, Jesus knew that the time had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father. Having loved those who were his own in the world, he loved them to the end.

<sup>2</sup>By the time the supper took place, the Devil had already put the idea into the heart of Judas, son of Simon Iscariot, to betray Jesus.

<sup>3</sup>Jesus knew that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going back to God. <sup>4</sup>He got up from the supper and laid aside his outer garment. He took a towel and tied it around his waist. <sup>5</sup>Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him.

<sup>6</sup>He came to Simon Peter, who asked him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?"

<sup>7</sup>Jesus answered him, "You do not understand what I am doing now, but later you will understand."

<sup>8</sup>Peter told him, "You will never, ever, wash my feet!"

Jesus replied, "If I do not wash you, you have no part with me."

<sup>9</sup>"Lord, not just my feet," Simon Peter replied, "but also my hands and my head!"

<sup>10</sup>Jesus told him, "A person who has had a bath needs only to wash his feet, but his body is completely clean. And you are clean, but not all of you." <sup>11</sup>Indeed, he knew who was going to betray him. That is why he said, "Not all of you are clean."

<sup>12</sup>After Jesus had washed their feet and put on his outer garment, he reclined at the table again. "Do you understand what I have done for you?" he asked them. <sup>13</sup>"You call me Teacher and Lord. You are right, because I am. <sup>14</sup>Now if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. <sup>15</sup>Yes, I have given you an example so that you also would do just as I have done for you.

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# Good Friday

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## First Lesson

**Isaiah 52:13-53:12**

<sup>13</sup>Look, my Servant will succeed.

He will rise. He will be exalted. He will be highly exalted.

<sup>14</sup>Just as many were appalled at him—

his appearance was so disfigured that he did not look like a man,  
and his form was more disfigured than any other person—

<sup>15</sup>so he will sprinkle many nations.

Because of him, kings will shut their mouths.

For they will see something they had never been told before.

Something they had never heard before they will understand.

<sup>53:1</sup>Who has believed our report,

and to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed?

<sup>2</sup>He grew up before him like a shoot  
and like a root from dry soil.

He had no attractiveness and no majesty.

We saw him, but nothing about his appearance made us desire him.

<sup>3</sup>He was despised and rejected by men,  
a man who knew grief

and was acquainted with suffering.

Like someone that people cannot bear to look at  
he was despised,

and we thought nothing of him.

<sup>4</sup>Surely he was taking up our weaknesses,

and he was carrying our sufferings,

but we thought he was stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted.

<sup>5</sup>But, in fact, he was pierced because of our rebellious deeds.

He was crushed because of our guilt.

The punishment to bring us peace was upon him,

and by his wounds we are healed.

<sup>6</sup>All of us like sheep have gone astray.

Each of us has turned to his own way,

but the LORD has laid on him the guilt of us all.

<sup>7</sup>He was oppressed, and he was afflicted,

yet he did not open his mouth.

Like a lamb he was led to the slaughter,

and like a sheep that is silent in the presence of her shearers,

so he did not open his mouth.

<sup>8</sup>He was taken away without protection and without justice.

Who of his generation even cared?

Yes, he was cut off from the land of the living.

Because of the rebellion of my people he was stricken.

<sup>9</sup>They intended to make his grave with the wicked,

but he was with the rich in his death,

because he had done no violence,

and no deceit was in his mouth.

<sup>10</sup>Yet the LORD was pleased to crush him.

He made him suffer.

When you make his life a guilt offering, he will see offspring.

He will lengthen his days,

and the LORD's pleasure will succeed in his hand.

<sup>11</sup>After the anguish of his soul he will see the light of life.

He will provide full satisfaction.

By knowledge of him my just Servant will justify the many,

for he himself carried their guilt.

<sup>12</sup>Therefore I will give him a share among the great,

and with the strong he will share plunder,

because he poured out his life to death,

and he let himself be counted with rebels,

and he himself bore the sin of many,

and he intercedes for the rebels.

## Second Lesson

### Hebrews 7:26-28

<sup>26</sup>This is certainly the kind of high priest we needed: one who is holy, innocent, pure, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. <sup>27</sup>Unlike the other high priests, he does not need to offer sacrifices on a daily basis, first for his own sins and then for the sins of the people. In fact, he sacrificed for sins once and for all when he offered himself. <sup>28</sup>For the law appoints as high priests men who have weaknesses. But the word of the oath, which came after the law, appointed the Son, who has been brought to his goal forever.

## Gospel

### John 18:1-19:42

After saying these things, Jesus went out with his disciples across the Kidron Valley, where there was a garden. He and his disciples went into it.

<sup>2</sup>Now Judas, who was betraying him, also knew the place, because Jesus often met there with his disciples. <sup>3</sup>So Judas took the company of soldiers and some guards from the chief priests and the Pharisees, and came there with lanterns, torches, and weapons.

<sup>4</sup>Jesus, knowing everything that was going to happen to him, went out and asked them, “Who are you looking for?”

<sup>5</sup>“Jesus the Nazarene,” they replied.

“I am he,” Jesus told them.

Judas, the betrayer, was standing with them. <sup>6</sup>When Jesus told them, “I am he,” they backed away and fell to the ground.

<sup>7</sup>Then Jesus asked them again, “Who are you looking for?”

“Jesus the Nazarene,” they said.

<sup>8</sup>“I told you that I am he,” Jesus replied. “So if you are looking for me, let these men go.” <sup>9</sup>This was to fulfill the statement he had spoken: “I did not lose any of those you have given me.”

<sup>10</sup>Then Simon Peter, who had a sword, drew it, struck the high priest’s servant, and cut off his right ear. The servant’s name was Malchus.

<sup>11</sup>So Jesus said to Peter, “Put your sword into its sheath. Shall I not drink the cup my Father has given me?”

<sup>12</sup>Then the company of soldiers, their commander, and the Jewish guards arrested Jesus and bound him. <sup>13</sup>First they led him to Annas, because he was father-in-law to Caiaphas, who was the high priest that year. <sup>14</sup>Now it was Caiaphas who had advised the Jews, “It is better that one man die for the people.”

<sup>15</sup>Simon Peter and another disciple kept following Jesus. That disciple was known to the high priest, so he went into the high priest’s courtyard with Jesus. <sup>16</sup>But Peter stood outside by the door. So the other disciple, the one known to the high priest, went out and talked to the girl watching the door and brought Peter in.

<sup>17</sup>“You are not one of this man’s disciples too, are you?” the girl at the door asked Peter.

“I am not!” he said.

<sup>18</sup>The servants and guards were standing around a fire of coals that they had made because it was cold. While they warmed themselves, Peter was standing with them, warming himself too.

<sup>19</sup>The high priest questioned Jesus about his disciples and his teaching.

<sup>20</sup>Jesus answered him, “I have spoken openly to the world. I always taught in a synagogue or at the temple, where all the Jews gather. I said nothing in secret. <sup>21</sup>Why are you questioning me? Ask those who heard what I told them. Look, they know what I said.”

<sup>22</sup>When he said this, one of the guards standing there hit Jesus in the face. “Is that how you answer the high priest?” he demanded.

<sup>23</sup>“If I said something wrong,” Jesus answered, “testify about what was wrong. But if I was right, why did you hit me?”

<sup>24</sup>Then Annas sent him bound to Caiaphas the high priest.

<sup>25</sup>Simon Peter continued to stand there warming himself. So they said to him, “You are not one of his disciples too, are you?”

He denied it, saying, “I am not!”

<sup>26</sup>One of the servants of the high priest, a relative of the man whose ear Peter had cut off, said, “Didn’t I see you with him in the garden?”

<sup>27</sup>Peter denied it again, and just then a rooster crowed.

<sup>28</sup>Early in the morning, the Jews led Jesus from Caiaphas to the Praetorium. They did not enter the Praetorium themselves, so that they would not become ceremonially unclean. (They wanted to

be able to eat the Passover meal.) <sup>29</sup>So Pilate went out to them and said, “What charge do you bring against this man?”

<sup>30</sup>They answered him, “If this man were not a criminal, we would not have handed him over to you.”

<sup>31</sup>Pilate told them, “Take him yourselves and judge him according to your law.”

The Jews said, “It’s not legal for us to put anyone to death.” <sup>32</sup>This happened so that the statement Jesus had spoken indicating what kind of death he was going to die would be fulfilled.

<sup>33</sup>Pilate went back into the Praetorium and summoned Jesus. He asked him, “Are you the King of the Jews?”

<sup>34</sup>Jesus answered, “Are you saying this on your own, or did others tell you about me?”

<sup>35</sup>Pilate answered, “Am I a Jew? Your own people and chief priests handed you over to me. What have you done?”

<sup>36</sup>Jesus replied, “My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would fight so that I would not be handed over to the Jews. But now my kingdom is not from here.”

<sup>37</sup>“You are a king then?” Pilate asked.

Jesus answered, “I am, as you say, a king. For this reason I was born, and for this reason I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.”

<sup>38</sup>“What is truth?” Pilate said to him.

After he said this, he went out again to the Jews and told them, “I find no basis for a charge against him. <sup>39</sup>But you have a custom that I release one prisoner to you at the Passover. So do you want me to release the King of the Jews for you?”

<sup>40</sup>Then they shouted back, “Not this man, but Barabbas!” (Now Barabbas was a rebel.)

<sup>19:1</sup>Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged. <sup>2</sup>The soldiers also twisted together a crown of thorns and placed it on his head. Then they threw a purple robe around him. <sup>3</sup>They kept coming to him, saying, “Hail, King of the Jews!” And they kept hitting him in the face.

<sup>4</sup>Pilate went outside again and said to them, “Look, I am bringing him out to you to let you know that I find no basis for a charge against him.”

<sup>5</sup>So Jesus came out wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, “Behold the man!”

<sup>6</sup>When the chief priests and guards saw him, they shouted, “Crucify! Crucify!”

Pilate told them, “Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no basis for a charge against him.”

<sup>7</sup>The Jews answered him, “We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die, because he claimed to be the Son of God.”

<sup>8</sup>When Pilate heard this statement, he was even more afraid. <sup>9</sup>He went back inside the palace again and asked Jesus, “Where are you from?”

But Jesus gave him no answer.

<sup>10</sup>So Pilate asked him, “Are you not talking to me? Don’t you know that I have the authority to release you or to crucify you?”

<sup>11</sup>Jesus answered, “You would have no authority over me at all if it had not been given to you from above. Therefore the one who handed me over to you has the greater sin.”

<sup>12</sup>From then on Pilate tried to release Jesus. But the Jews shouted, “If you let this man go, you are no friend of Caesar! Anyone who claims to be a king opposes Caesar!”

<sup>13</sup>When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus outside. He sat down on the judge's seat at a place called the Stone Pavement, or Gabbatha in Aramaic. <sup>14</sup>It was about the sixth hour on the Preparation Day for the Passover. Pilate said to the Jews, "Here is your king!"

<sup>15</sup>They shouted, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!"

Pilate said to them, "Should I crucify your king?"

"We have no king but Caesar!" the chief priests answered.

<sup>16</sup>So then Pilate handed Jesus over to them to be crucified.

So they took Jesus away. <sup>17</sup>Carrying his own cross, he went out to what is called the Place of a Skull, which in Aramaic is called Golgotha. <sup>18</sup>There they crucified him with two others, one on each side, and Jesus in the middle.

<sup>19</sup>Pilate also had a notice written and fastened on the cross. It read, "Jesus the Nazarene, the King of the Jews."

<sup>20</sup>Many of the Jews read this notice, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and it was written in Aramaic, Latin, and Greek.

<sup>21</sup>So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but that 'this man said, "I am the King of the Jews.'""

<sup>22</sup>Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

<sup>23</sup>When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier. They also took his tunic, which was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom. <sup>24</sup>So they said to one another, "Let's not tear it. Instead, let's cast lots to see who gets it." This was so that the Scripture might be fulfilled which says:

They divided my garments among them  
and cast lots for my clothing.

So the soldiers did these things.

<sup>25</sup>Jesus' mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene were standing near the cross.

<sup>26</sup>When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son!" <sup>27</sup>Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother!" And from that time this disciple took her into his own home.

<sup>28</sup>After this, knowing that everything had now been finished, and to fulfill the Scripture, Jesus said, "I thirst."

<sup>29</sup>A jar full of sour wine was sitting there. So they put a sponge soaked in sour wine on a hyssop branch and held it to his mouth.

<sup>30</sup>When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished!" Then, bowing his head, he gave up his spirit.

<sup>31</sup>Since it was the Preparation Day, the Jews did not want the bodies left on the crosses over the Sabbath (because that Sabbath was a particularly important day). They asked Pilate to have the men's legs broken and the bodies taken away. <sup>32</sup>So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first man who was crucified with Jesus, and then those of the other man.

<sup>33</sup>But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs.

<sup>34</sup>Instead, one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear. Immediately blood and water came out.

<sup>35</sup>The one who saw it has testified, and his testimony is true. He knows that he is telling the truth, so that you also may believe. <sup>36</sup>Indeed, these things happened so that the Scripture would be fulfilled,

“Not one of his bones will be broken.” <sup>37</sup>Again another Scripture says, “They will look at the one they pierced.”

<sup>38</sup>After this, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate to let him remove Jesus’ body. When Pilate gave him permission, he came and took Jesus’ body away. <sup>39</sup>Nicodemus, who earlier had come to Jesus at night, also came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-two pounds.

<sup>40</sup>They took Jesus’ body and bound it with linen strips along with the spices, in accord with Jewish burial customs.

<sup>41</sup>There was a garden at the place where Jesus was crucified. And in the garden was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. <sup>42</sup>So they laid Jesus there, because it was the Jewish Preparation Day, and the tomb was near.

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
