

This month's pictures are from the EHV Study Bible of Jeremiah. They therefore go with this month's article.




A bulla of Baruch ben Neriah.

The fingerprint (not noticeable in the photograph) is located in the highlighted area.

This seal impression from the ruins of Jerusalem contains the name and thumbprint of Baruch the son of Neriah, who was the scribe of Jeremiah. Some suspect the seal is a forgery.




