



DER HEILAND THE SAVIOR



This book is a devotional commentary based on a harmony of the gospels. Written by a Missouri Synod pastor, Carl Manthey-Zorn, it was originally published in German as *Der Heiland* by Northwestern Publishing House in the early 20th century. The author tells us for whom the volume was written: "The audience for whom I have written is not the learned people of the world but the people of Christ." Zorn paints a portrait of Christ: who he is, what he did, what he taught, and how he revealed himself as God's Son and the world's Savior.

Der Heiland was translated as *The Savior* by WELS pastor John Sullivan, who knew Zorn's work from his childhood in a German-speaking home. The Savior uses the EHV as its English Bible. You can read a more detailed description of the book, the author, and the translator on Amazon.com.






This Month's Pictures


How was the nation of Edom formed?




