## Old Testament / First Reading

#### Joel 2:12-19

<sup>12</sup>Even now, declares the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and grief.

<sup>13</sup>Tear your heart and not your clothing. Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in mercy, and he relents from sending disaster.

<sup>14</sup>Who knows?

He may turn and have pity and leave behind a blessing—grain offerings and drink offerings for the LORD your God.

<sup>15</sup>Blow the ram's horn in Zion.

Set aside a day for fasting.

Call a solemn convocation.

<sup>16</sup>Gather the people.

Consecrate the assembly.

Bring together the elders.

Gather the children, even those nursing at the breast.

Let the bridegroom leave his room,

and the bride her chamber.

<sup>17</sup>Let the priests, who minister before the LORD,

weep between the temple porch and the altar.

Let them say:

Have compassion on your people, O LORD.

Do not subject the inheritance you have given us to the scorn of the nations.

Do not make us notorious among the nations as an object of ridicule.

Why should they say among the peoples,

"Where is their God?"

<sup>18</sup>The LORD is zealous for his land,

and he will take pity on his people.

<sup>19</sup>The LORD will respond to them:

I am sending you grain, new wine, and fresh oil, enough to satisfy you fully.

Never again will I subject you to scorn among the nations.

## **Epistle / Second Reading**

#### 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10

We urge you, on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup>God made him, who did not know sin, to become sin for us, so that we might become the righteousness of God in him.

<sup>6:1</sup>As fellow workers we also urge you not to receive God's grace in vain. <sup>2</sup>For he says:

At a favorable time I listened to you,

and in the day of salvation I helped you.

Look, now is the favorable time! See, now is the day of salvation!

<sup>3</sup>We are giving no one a reason to stumble in any way, so that our ministry will not be blamed. <sup>4</sup>Rather, in every way we show ourselves to be God's ministers: in great endurance, in troubles, in hardships, in difficulties, <sup>5</sup>in beatings, in imprisonments, in riots, in hard work, in sleepless nights, in times of hunger; <sup>6</sup>in purity, in knowledge, in patience, in kindness, in the Holy Spirit, in sincere love, <sup>7</sup>in the word of truth, in the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness on the right and on the left; <sup>8</sup>through glory and dishonor, through bad report and good report; treated as deceivers yet being honest, <sup>9</sup>treated as unknown and yet being well known; as dying, and yet look—we live; as punished yet not put to death; <sup>10</sup>as grieving yet always rejoicing; as poor yet making many rich; as having nothing yet possessing everything.

## **Holy Gospel**

#### Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

"Be careful that you do not do your righteous works in front of people, so that they will notice. If you do, you have no reward from your Father who is in heaven. <sup>2</sup>So whenever you perform acts of mercy, do not sound a trumpet for yourself, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets to be praised by people. Amen<sup>a</sup> I tell you: They have received their reward. <sup>3</sup>Instead, when you perform acts of mercy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing. <sup>4</sup>Then your acts of mercy will be in secret, and your Father who sees what is done in secret will reward you.

<sup>5</sup>"Whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites. They love to stand and pray in the synagogues and on the street corners so that they may be seen by people. Amen I tell you: They have received their reward. <sup>6</sup>But whenever you pray, go into your private room, close your door, and pray to your Father who is unseen. And your Father, who sees what others cannot see, will reward you.

<sup>16</sup>"Whenever you fast, do not make yourself look sad like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces to show everyone that they are fasting. Amen I tell you: They have received their reward. <sup>17</sup>But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, <sup>18</sup>so that it is not apparent to people that you are fasting, but only to your Father who sees what is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you.

<sup>19</sup>"Do not store up treasures for yourselves on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. <sup>20</sup>But store up treasures for yourselves in heaven, where moth and rust do

not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. <sup>21</sup> Because where your treasure is, there you heart will be also.

# The First Sunday in Lent

## Old Testament / First Reading

#### Genesis 3:1-21

Now the serpent was more clever than any wild animal which the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Has God really said, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?"

<sup>2</sup>The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat fruit from the trees of the garden, <sup>3</sup>but not from the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden. God has said, 'You shall not eat from it. You shall not touch it, or else you will die.'"

<sup>4</sup>The serpent said to the woman, "You certainly will not die. <sup>5</sup>In fact, God knows that the day you eat from it, your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil."

<sup>6</sup>When the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was appealing to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable to make one wise, she took some of its fruit and ate. She gave some also to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. <sup>7</sup>The eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized that they were naked. They sewed fig leaves together and made coverings for their waists. <sup>8</sup>They heard the voice of the LORD God, who was walking around in the garden during the cooler part of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden.

<sup>9</sup>The LORD God called to the man and said to him, "Where are you?"

<sup>10</sup>The man said, "I heard your voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked, so I hid myself."

<sup>11</sup>God said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree from which I commanded you not to eat?"

 $^{12}$ The man said, "The woman you gave to be with me—she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate it."

<sup>13</sup>The LORD God said to the woman, "What have you done?"

The woman said, "The serpent deceived me, and I ate."

<sup>14</sup>The LORD God said to the serpent:

Because you have done this,

you are cursed more than all the livestock,

and more than every wild animal.

You shall crawl on your belly,

and you shall eat dust all the days of your life.

<sup>15</sup>I will put hostility between you and the woman,

and between your seed and her seed.

He will crush your head,

and you will crush his heel.

<sup>16</sup>To the woman he said:

I will greatly increase your pain in childbearing.

With painful labor you will give birth to children.

Your desire will be for your husband,

but he will rule over you.

<sup>17</sup>To Adam he said:

Because you listened to your wife's voice

and ate from the tree about which I commanded you,

"You shall not eat from it,"

the soil is cursed on account of you.

You will eat from it with painful labor all the days of your life.

<sup>18</sup>Thorns and thistles will spring up from the ground for you,

but you will eat the crops of the field.

<sup>19</sup>By the sweat of your face you will eat bread

until you return to the soil,

for out of it you were taken.

For you are dust,

and to dust you shall return.

<sup>20</sup>The man named his wife Eve because she would be the mother of all the living. <sup>21</sup>The LORD God made clothing of animal skins for Adam and for his wife and clothed them.

## **Epistle / Second Reading**

#### Romans 5:12-19

<sup>12</sup>So then, just as sin entered the world through one man and death through sin, so also death spread to all people because all sinned. <sup>13</sup>For even before the law was given, sin was in the world. Now, sin is not charged to one's account if there is no law, <sup>14</sup>and yet death reigned from the time of Adam to the time of Moses, even over those whose sin was not like the transgression of Adam, who is a pattern of the one who was to come.

<sup>15</sup>But the gracious gift is not like Adam's trespass. For if the many died by the trespass of this one man, it is even more certain that God's grace, and the gift given by the grace of the one man Jesus Christ, overflowed to the many!

<sup>16</sup>And the gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin, for the judgment that followed the one trespass resulted in a verdict of condemnation, but the gracious gift that followed many trespasses resulted in a verdict of justification.

<sup>17</sup>Indeed, if by the trespass of the one man, death reigned through the one man, it is even more certain that those who receive the overflowing grace of the gift of righteousness will reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ!

<sup>18</sup>So then, just as one trespass led to a verdict of condemnation for all people, so also one righteous verdict led to life-giving justification for all people. <sup>19</sup>For just as through the disobedience of one man the many became sinners, so also through the obedience of one man the many will become righteous.

## **Holy Gospel**

#### Matthew 4:1-11

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the Devil. <sup>2</sup>After he had fasted forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. <sup>3</sup>The Tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become bread."

<sup>4</sup>But Jesus answered, "It is written:

Man shall not live by bread alone,

but by every word that comes out of the mouth of God."

<sup>5</sup>Then the Devil took him into the holy city. He placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, <sup>6</sup>and he said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down. For it is written:

He will command his angels concerning you.

And they will lift you up in their hands,

so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."

<sup>7</sup>Jesus said to him, "Again, it is written:

You shall not test the Lord your God."

<sup>8</sup>Again the Devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. <sup>9</sup>He said to him, "I will give you all of these things, if you will bow down and worship me."

<sup>10</sup>Then Jesus said to him, "Go away, Satan! For it is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'"

<sup>11</sup>Then the Devil left him, and just then angels came and served him.

# The Second Sunday in Lent

## Old Testament / First Reading

#### Genesis 12:1-9

Now the LORD said to Abram, "Get out of your country and away from your relatives and from your father's house and go to the land that I will show you. <sup>2</sup>I will make you a great nation. I will bless you and make your name great. You will be a blessing. <sup>3</sup>I will bless those who bless you, and I will curse anyone who dishonors you. All of the families of the earth will be blessed in you."

<sup>4</sup>So Abram went, as the LORD had told him. Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran. <sup>5</sup>Abram took Sarai his wife, Lot his brother's son, and all the possessions they had accumulated and the people that they had acquired in Haran, and they set out to travel to the land of Canaan. Eventually they arrived in the land of Canaan. <sup>6</sup>Abram passed through the land until he came to the Oak of Moreh at the place called Shechem. The Canaanites were in the land at that time.

<sup>7</sup>The LORD appeared to Abram and said, "I will give this land to your descendants." Abram built an altar there to the LORD, who had appeared to him.

<sup>8</sup>He moved on from there to the hill country east of Bethel and pitched his tent there, with Bethel on the west and Ai on the east. There he built an altar to the LORD and proclaimed the name of the LORD. <sup>9</sup>Abram pulled out from there and kept traveling toward the Negev.

## Epistle / Second Reading

#### Romans 4:1-8, 13-17

What then will we say that Abraham, our forefather, discovered according to the flesh? <sup>2</sup>If indeed Abraham had been justified by works, he would have had a reason to boast—but not before God. <sup>3</sup>For what does Scripture say? "Abraham believed God and it was credited to him as righteousness."

<sup>4</sup>Now to a person who works, his pay is not counted as a gift but as something owed. <sup>5</sup>But to the person who does not work but believes in the God who justifies the ungodly, his faith is credited to him as righteousness.

<sup>6</sup>This is exactly what David says about the blessed state of the person to whom God credits righteousness apart from works:

<sup>7</sup>Blessed are those whose lawless deeds are forgiven and whose sins are covered.

<sup>8</sup>Blessed is the man whose sin the Lord will never count against him.

<sup>13</sup>Indeed, the promise that he would be the heir of the world was not given to Abraham or his descendants through the law, but through the righteousness that is by faith. <sup>14</sup>To be sure, if people are heirs by the law, faith is empty and the promise is nullified. <sup>15</sup>For law brings wrath. (Where there is no law, there is no transgression.) <sup>16</sup>For this reason, the promise is by faith, so that it may be according to grace and may be guaranteed to all of Abraham's descendants—not only to the one

who is a descendant by law, but also to the one who has the faith of Abraham. He is the father of us all. <sup>17</sup>As it is written: "I have made you a father of many nations."

## Holy Gospel

#### John 3:1-17

There was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish ruling council. <sup>2</sup>He came to Jesus at night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God, for no one can do these miraculous signs you are doing unless God is with him."

<sup>3</sup>Jesus replied, "Amen, Amen, <sup>a</sup> I tell you: Unless someone is born from above, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

<sup>4</sup>Nicodemus said to him, "How can a man be born when he is old? He cannot enter a second time into his mother's womb and be born, can he?"

<sup>5</sup>Jesus answered, "Amen, Amen, I tell you: Unless someone is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God! <sup>6</sup>Whatever is born of the flesh is flesh. Whatever is born of the Spirit is spirit. <sup>7</sup>Do not be surprised when I tell you that you must be born from above. <sup>8</sup>The wind blows where it pleases. You hear its sound, but you do not know where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit."

<sup>9</sup>"How can these things be?" asked Nicodemus.

<sup>10</sup>"You are the teacher of Israel," Jesus answered, "and you do not know these things? <sup>11</sup>Amen, Amen, I tell you: We speak what we know, and we testify about what we have seen. But you people do not accept our testimony. <sup>12</sup>If I have told you earthly things and you do not believe, how will you believe if I tell you heavenly things? <sup>13</sup>No one has ascended into heaven, except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man, who is in heaven.

<sup>14</sup>"Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, <sup>15</sup>so that everyone who believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

<sup>16</sup>"For God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish, but have eternal life. <sup>17</sup>For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him.

# The Third Sunday in Lent

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## Old Testament / First Reading

Exodus 17:1-7

The entire Israelite community set out on their journey from the Wilderness of Sin as the LORD had commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. <sup>2</sup>So the people quarreled with Moses and said, "Give us water to drink."

Moses said to them, "Why are you quarreling with me? Why are you testing the LORD?"

<sup>3</sup>But the people were thirsty for water there, so they grumbled against Moses. They said, "Why did you ever bring us up out of Egypt to let us, our children, and our livestock die of thirst?"

<sup>4</sup>Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do with these people? They are almost ready to stone me!"

<sup>5</sup>The LORD said to Moses, "Go in front of the people, and take the elders of Israel with you. Also take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. <sup>6</sup>Watch me. I will stand there in front of you on the rock in Horeb. You are to strike the rock. Water will come out of it, and the people will drink." Moses did that in the sight of the elders of Israel. <sup>7</sup>He named the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled, and because they tested the LORD by saying, "Is the LORD among us or not?"

## **Epistle / Second Reading**

**Romans 5:1-8** 

Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>2</sup>Through him we also have obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand. And we rejoice confidently on the basis of our hope for the glory of God.

<sup>3</sup>Not only this, but we also rejoice confidently in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces patient endurance, <sup>4</sup>and patient endurance produces tested character, and tested character produces hope. <sup>5</sup>And hope will not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, who was given to us.

<sup>6</sup>For at the appointed time, while we were still helpless, Christ died for the ungodly. <sup>7</sup>It is rare indeed that someone will die for a righteous person. Perhaps someone might actually go so far as to die for a person who has been good to him. <sup>8</sup>But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

## **Holy Gospel**

John 4:5-26 (27-30, 39-42)

<sup>5</sup>So he came to a town in Samaria called Sychar, near the piece of land Jacob gave to his son Joseph. <sup>6</sup>Jacob's well was there. Then Jesus, being tired from the journey, sat down by the well. It was about the sixth hour.

<sup>7</sup>A woman from Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." <sup>8</sup>(His disciples had gone into town to buy food.)

<sup>9</sup>The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask for a drink from me, a Samaritan woman?" (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans.)

<sup>10</sup>Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water."

<sup>11</sup>"Sir," she said, "you don't even have a bucket, and the well is deep. So where do you get this living water? <sup>12</sup>You are not greater than our father Jacob, are you? He gave us this well and drank from it himself, as did his sons and his animals."

<sup>13</sup>Jesus answered her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, <sup>14</sup>but whoever drinks the water I will give him will never be thirsty ever again. Rather, the water I will give him will become in him a spring of water, bubbling up to eternal life."

<sup>15</sup>"Sir, give me this water," the woman said to him, "so I won't get thirsty and have to keep coming here to draw water."

<sup>16</sup>Jesus told her, "Go, call your husband, and come back here."

<sup>17</sup>"I have no husband," the woman answered.

Jesus said to her, "You are right when you say, 'I have no husband.' <sup>18</sup>In fact, you have had five husbands, and the man you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true."

<sup>19</sup>"Sir," the woman replied, "I see that you are a prophet. <sup>20</sup>Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, but you Jews insist that the place where we must worship is in Jerusalem."

<sup>21</sup>Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, a time is coming when you will not worship the Father on this mountain or in Jerusalem. <sup>22</sup>You Samaritans worship what you do not know. We worship what we do know, because salvation is from the Jews. <sup>23</sup>But a time is coming and now is here when the real worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and in truth, for those are the kind of worshippers the Father seeks. <sup>24</sup>God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and in truth."

<sup>25</sup>The woman said to him, "I know that Messiah is coming" (the one called Christ). "When he comes, he will explain everything to us."

<sup>26</sup>Jesus said to her, "I, the one speaking to you, am he."

<sup>27</sup>Just then his disciples returned and were surprised that he was talking to a woman. Yet no one asked, "What do you want?" or "Why are you talking to her?"

<sup>28</sup>Then the woman left her water jar and went back into town. She said to the people, <sup>29</sup>"Come, see the man who told me everything I ever did. Could this be the Christ?" <sup>30</sup>They left the town and came to him.

<sup>39</sup>Many Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony: "He told me everything I ever did." <sup>40</sup>So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them. And he stayed there two days. <sup>41</sup>Many more believed because of his message. <sup>42</sup>They told the woman, "We no longer believe because of what you said. Now we have heard for ourselves. And we know that this really is the Savior of the world."

#### Isaiah 42:14-21

<sup>14</sup>I have been silent for a long time.

I have kept still. I have restrained myself.

But now, like a woman giving birth, I will scream.

I will gasp and pant.

<sup>15</sup>I will dry up mountains and hills.

I will make all their grass wither.

I will turn rivers into islands.

I will dry up pools.

<sup>16</sup>I will lead the blind on a way they do not know.

Along paths they do not know I will direct them.

Ahead of them I will turn darkness into light

and rough places into level ground.

These are the things I will accomplish for them.

I will not abandon them.

<sup>17</sup>They will be turned back and completely disgraced—those who trust in an idol,

those who say to molten images, "You are our gods."

<sup>18</sup>You deaf ones, listen!

You blind ones, watch carefully so that you can see!

<sup>19</sup>Who is as blind as my servant?

Who is as deaf as my messenger whom I sent?

Who is as blind as my associate,

as blind as the servant of the LORD?

<sup>20</sup>You, Israel, see many things, but you do not observe.

Israel opens his ears, but he does not hear.

<sup>21</sup>Because of his own righteousness,

the LORD was pleased to make his law great and glorious.

## Epistle / Second Reading

### Ephesians 5:8-14

<sup>8</sup>For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light, <sup>9</sup>for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness, and truth. <sup>10</sup>Try to learn what is pleasing to the Lord, <sup>11</sup>and do not participate in fruitless deeds of darkness. Instead, expose them. <sup>12</sup>For it is shameful even to mention the things that are done by people in secret. <sup>13</sup>But everything exposed by

the light becomes visible, for it is light that makes things visible. <sup>14</sup>Therefore it is said, "Awake, sleeper, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

## **Holy Gospel**

#### John 9:1-41

As Jesus was passing by, he saw a man blind from birth. <sup>2</sup>His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?"

<sup>3</sup>Jesus answered, "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that God's works might be revealed in connection with him. <sup>4</sup>I must do the works of him who sent me while it is day. Night is coming when no one can work. <sup>5</sup>As long as I am in the world, I am the Light of the World."

<sup>6</sup>After saying this, Jesus spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and spread the mud on the man's eyes. <sup>7</sup>"Go," Jesus told him, "wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means "Sent"). So he went and washed, and came back seeing.

<sup>8</sup>His neighbors and those who had seen him before this as a beggar asked, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?"

<sup>9</sup>Some said, "He is the one."

Others said, "No, but he looks like him."

He kept saying, "I am the one!"

<sup>10</sup>So they asked him, "How were your eyes opened?"

<sup>11</sup>He answered, "The man who is called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and told me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' So I went and washed, and then I could see."

<sup>12</sup>"Where is he?" they asked.

"I don't know," he said.

<sup>13</sup>They brought this man who had been blind to the Pharisees. <sup>14</sup>Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. <sup>15</sup>So the Pharisees also asked him how he received his sight.

"He put mud on my eyes," the man told them. "I washed, and now I see."

<sup>16</sup>Then some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God because he does not keep the Sabbath." Others were saying, "How can a sinful man work such miraculous signs?"

There was division among them, <sup>17</sup>so they said to the blind man again, "What do you say about him, because he opened your eyes?"

The man replied, "He is a prophet."

<sup>18</sup>The Jews still did not believe that he had been blind and received his sight, until they summoned the parents of the man who had received his sight. <sup>19</sup>They asked them, "Is this your son, the one you say was born blind? How is it, then, that he can see now?"

<sup>20</sup>"We know that this is our son," his parents answered, "and that he was born blind. <sup>21</sup>But we do not know how he can see now, or who opened his eyes. Ask him. He is old enough. ## **Epistle / Second Reading**

#### Romans 8:1-11

So then, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. <sup>2</sup>For in Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death. <sup>3</sup>Indeed, what the law was unable to do, because it was weakened by the flesh, God did, when he sent his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh to deal with sin. God condemned sin in his flesh, <sup>4</sup>so that the righteous decree of the law would be fully satisfied in us who are not walking according to the flesh, but according to the spirit.

## **Holy Gospel**

#### John 11:1-45 (46-53)

Now a certain man named Lazarus was sick. He was from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. <sup>2</sup>This Mary, whose brother Lazarus was sick, was the same Mary who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair.

<sup>3</sup>So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, saying, "Lord, the one you love is sick!"

<sup>36</sup>Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" <sup>37</sup>But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

<sup>38</sup>Jesus was deeply moved again as he came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. <sup>39</sup>"Take away the stone," he said.

Martha, the dead man's sister, told him, "Lord, by this time there will be an odor, because it has been four days."

<sup>40</sup>Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?" <sup>41</sup>So they took away the stone.

They paid him thirty pieces of silver. <sup>16</sup>From that time on Judas was looking for an opportunity to betray Jesus.

<sup>17</sup>On the first day of the Festival of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus, saying, "Where do you want us to make preparations for you to eat the Passover?"

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>a</sup> Usually, people say Amen at the end of a prayer. But Jesus used this Hebrew word at the beginning of a statement, which was unique. The inspired writer simply transliterated the Hebrew word that Jesus spoke, instead of using a Greek term. This translation does the same in English. The basic meaning is I solemnly tell you the truth. For more information about this, see FAQ #1 at wartburgproject.org/faqs

<sup>18</sup>He said, "Go into the city to a certain man and tell him the Teacher says, 'My time is near. I will observe the Passover with my disciples at your house.'"

<sup>19</sup>The disciples did as Jesus commanded them and prepared the Passover. <sup>20</sup>When evening came, Jesus was reclining at the table with the Twelve.

<sup>21</sup>As they were eating, he said, "Amen I tell you: One of you will betray me."

<sup>22</sup>They were very sad and began to say to him one after another, "Surely, not I, Lord?"

<sup>23</sup>He replied, "The one who dipped his hand in the bowl with me will betray me. <sup>24</sup>The Son of Man is going just as it is written about him, but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! It would be better for that man if he had not been born."

<sup>42</sup>He went away a second time and prayed, "My Father, if it is not possible for this cup to pass from me unless I drink it, may your will be done." <sup>43</sup>Again he returned and found them sleeping, because their eyes were heavy. <sup>44</sup>He left them again, went away, and prayed a third time. He said the same words as before. <sup>45</sup>Then he returned to his disciples and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and resting? Look, the hour is near, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. <sup>46</sup>Rise. Let us go. Look, my betrayer is near."

<sup>47</sup>While Jesus was still speaking, suddenly Judas (one of the Twelve) arrived. With him was a large crowd with swords and clubs, who came from the chief priests and elders of the people. <sup>48</sup>Now

the betrayer had given them a sign: "The one I kiss is the man. Arrest him." <sup>49</sup>Immediately he went to Jesus and said, "Greetings, Rabbi!" and kissed him.

<sup>50</sup>Jesus said to him, "Friend, why are you here?"

Then they advanced, took hold of Jesus, and arrested him. <sup>51</sup>Suddenly, one of the men with Jesus reached out his hand, drew his sword, and struck the servant of the high priest, cutting off his ear. <sup>52</sup>Then Jesus said to him, "Put your sword back into its place, because all who take the sword will die by the sword. <sup>53</sup>Do you not realize that I could call on my Father, and at once he would provide me with more than twelve legions of angels? <sup>54</sup>But then how would the Scriptures be fulfilled that say it must happen this way?"

<sup>55</sup>At that same time Jesus said to the crowd, "Have you come out to arrest me with swords and clubs as if I were a robber? Day after day I was sitting in the temple courts teaching, and you did not arrest me. <sup>56</sup>But all this has happened so that the writings of the prophets would be fulfilled." Then all the disciples deserted him and fled.

<sup>57</sup>Those who had arrested Jesus led him away to Caiaphas, the high priest, where the experts in the law and the elders were assembled. <sup>58</sup>Peter was following him at a distance and went as far as the courtyard of the high priest. He went inside and sat down with the guards to see how it would turn out.

<sup>59</sup>The chief priests and the whole Sanhedrin were looking for false testimony against Jesus so that they could put him to death. <sup>60</sup>They found none, even though many false witnesses came forward. Finally two came forward <sup>61</sup>and said, "This fellow said, 'I am able to destroy the temple of God and rebuild it in three days.'"

<sup>62</sup>The high priest stood up and said to him, "Have you no answer? What is this that these men are testifying against you?" <sup>63</sup>But Jesus remained silent. Then the high priest said to him, "I place you under oath by the living God: Tell us if you are the Christ, the Son of God!"

<sup>64</sup>Jesus said to him, "It is as you have said. But I tell you, soon you will see the Son of Man sitting at the right hand of power and coming on the clouds of heaven."

<sup>65</sup>Then the high priest tore his robes and said, "He has spoken blasphemy! Why do we need any more witnesses? See, you have just heard the blasphemy! <sup>66</sup>What do you think?"

They answered, "He is deserving of death!" <sup>67</sup>Then they spit in his face and punched him. Some slapped him <sup>68</sup>and said, "Prophesy to us, Christ! Who hit you?"

<sup>69</sup>Meanwhile Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. A servant girl came to him and said, "You were also with Jesus the Galilean."

<sup>70</sup>But he denied it in front of everyone, saying, "I don't know what you're talking about."

<sup>71</sup>When Peter went out to the entryway, someone else saw him and said to those who were there, "This fellow was with Jesus of Nazareth."

<sup>72</sup>Again Peter denied it with an oath and said, "I do not know the man."

<sup>73</sup>After a little while those who stood by came and said to Peter, "Surely you are also one of them because even your accent gives you away."

<sup>74</sup>Then he began to curse and to swear, "I do not know the man!" Just then the rooster crowed. <sup>75</sup>And Peter remembered the word Jesus had spoken, "Before the rooster crows, you will deny me three times." And he went outside and wept bitterly.

<sup>27:1</sup>Early in the morning, all the chief priests and the elders of the people reached the decision to put Jesus to death. <sup>2</sup>They bound him, led him away, and handed him over to Pontius Pilate, the governor.

<sup>3</sup>Then when Judas, who had betrayed him, saw that Jesus was condemned, he felt remorse. He brought back the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and elders <sup>4</sup>and said, "I have sinned by betraying innocent blood." But they said, "What is that to us? That's your problem."

<sup>5</sup>He threw the pieces of silver into the temple and left. Then he went out and hanged himself. <sup>6</sup>The chief priests took the pieces of silver and said, "It is not lawful to put these into the treasury, since it is blood money." <sup>7</sup>They reached a decision to buy the potter's field with the money, as a burial place for foreigners. <sup>8</sup>So that field has been called the Field of Blood to this day. <sup>9</sup>Then what was spoken through Jeremiah the prophet was fulfilled:

They took the thirty pieces of silver, the price the sons of Israel had set for him, <sup>10</sup> and they gave them for the potter's field, just as the Lord commanded me.

<sup>11</sup>When Jesus stood in the presence of the governor, the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus said to him, "It is as you say."

<sup>12</sup>When he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he answered nothing. <sup>13</sup>Then Pilate said to him, "Don't you hear how many things they are testifying against you?"

<sup>14</sup>But he did not answer him—not even one word, so that the governor was very surprised.

<sup>15</sup>At the time of the Festival the governor had a custom to release to the crowd any one prisoner they wanted. <sup>16</sup>At that time they were holding a notorious prisoner named Barabbas. <sup>17</sup>So when they were assembled, Pilate said to them, "Which one do you want me to release to you? Barabbas—or Jesus, who is called Christ?" <sup>18</sup>For Pilate knew that they had handed Jesus over to him because of envy.

<sup>19</sup>While he was sitting on the judgment seat, Pilate's wife sent him a message. "Have nothing to do with that righteous man," she said, "since I have suffered many things today in a dream because of him." <sup>20</sup>But the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowd to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus put to death. <sup>21</sup>The governor asked them, "Which of the two do you want me to release to you?"

"Barabbas!" they said.

<sup>22</sup>Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus, who is called Christ?"

They all said to him, "Crucify him!"

<sup>23</sup>But the governor said, "Why? What has he done wrong?"

But they kept shouting even louder: "Crucify him!"

<sup>24</sup>When Pilate saw that he was accomplishing nothing and that instead it was turning into a riot, he took water, washed his hands in front of the crowd, and said, "I am innocent of this righteous man's blood. It is your responsibility."

<sup>25</sup>And all the people answered, "Let his blood be on us and on our children!"

<sup>26</sup>Then he released Barabbas to them, but he had Jesus flogged and handed him over to be crucified.

<sup>27</sup>Then the governor's soldiers took Jesus into the Praetorium and gathered the whole cohort of soldiers around him. <sup>28</sup>They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him. <sup>29</sup>They twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head. They put a staff in his right hand, knelt in front of him, and

mocked him by saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" <sup>30</sup>They spit on him, took the staff, and hit him repeatedly on his head.

<sup>31</sup>After they had mocked him, they took off the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

<sup>32</sup>As they were going out of the city, they found a man of Cyrene named Simon. They forced him to carry Jesus' cross. <sup>33</sup>They came to a place called Golgotha, which means, "The place of the skull." <sup>34</sup>They offered Jesus wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. <sup>35</sup>After they had crucified him, they divided his clothing among themselves by casting lots. <sup>36</sup>Then they sat down and were keeping watch over him there. <sup>37</sup>Above his head they posted the written charge against him: "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews."

<sup>38</sup>At the same time two criminals were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. <sup>39</sup>People who passed by kept insulting him, shaking their heads <sup>40</sup>and saying, "You who were going to destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross!"

<sup>41</sup>In the same way the chief priests, experts in the law, and elders kept mocking him. They said, <sup>42</sup>"He saved others, but he cannot save himself. If he's the King of Israel, let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. <sup>43</sup>He trusts in God. Let God rescue him now, if he wants him, because he said, 'I am the Son of God.'" <sup>44</sup>In the same way even the criminals who were crucified with him kept insulting him.

<sup>45</sup>From the sixth hour until the ninth hour, there was darkness over all the land. <sup>46</sup>About the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

<sup>47</sup>When some of those standing there heard this, they said, "This fellow is calling for Elijah."

<sup>48</sup>Immediately one of them ran, took a sponge, and soaked it with sour wine. Then he put it on a stick and gave him a drink. <sup>49</sup>The rest said, "Leave him alone. Let's see if Elijah comes to save him."

<sup>50</sup>After Jesus cried out again with a loud voice, he gave up his spirit. <sup>51</sup>Suddenly, the temple curtain was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook and rocks were split. <sup>52</sup>Tombs were opened, and many bodies of saints who had fallen asleep were raised to life. <sup>53</sup>Those who came out of the tombs went into the holy city after Jesus' resurrection and appeared to many people. <sup>54</sup>When the centurion and those who were guarding Jesus with him saw the earthquake and the things that had happened, they were terrified and said, "Truly this was the Son of God."

<sup>55</sup>Many women who had followed Jesus from Galilee and who had served him were there, watching from a distance. <sup>56</sup>Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of Zebedee's sons.

<sup>57</sup>When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who was also a disciple of Jesus. <sup>58</sup>He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate ordered that it be given to him. <sup>59</sup>Joseph took the body, wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, <sup>60</sup>and laid it in his own new tomb that he had cut in the rock. He rolled a large stone over the tomb's entrance and left. <sup>61</sup>Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were there sitting opposite the tomb.

<sup>62</sup>On the next day, which was the day after the Preparation Day, the chief priests and Pharisees gathered in the presence of Pilate <sup>63</sup>and said, "Sir, we remembered what that deceiver said while he was still alive: 'After three days I will rise again.' <sup>64</sup>So give a command that the tomb be made secure

until the third day. Otherwise his disciples might steal his body and tell the people, 'He is risen from the dead.' And this last deception will be worse than the first."

<sup>65</sup>Pilate said to them, "You have a guard. Go, make it as secure as you know how." <sup>66</sup>So they went and made the tomb secure by sealing the stone and posting a guard.

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#### John 12:20-43

<sup>20</sup>Now there were some Greeks among those who went up to worship at the Festival. <sup>21</sup>They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and asked him, "Sir, we want to see Jesus." <sup>22</sup>Philip went to tell Andrew. Andrew came with Philip and told Jesus.

<sup>23</sup>Jesus answered them, "The time has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. <sup>24</sup>Amen, Amen," I tell you: Unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it continues to be one kernel. But if it dies, it produces much grain. <sup>25</sup>Anyone who loves his life destroys it. Under his feet they saw what looked like a pavement of sapphire as clear as the sky. <sup>11</sup>The LORD did not lay his hand on the dignitaries of the people of Israel. They gazed at God, and they ate and drank.

#### Exodus 12:1-14

The LORD told Moses and Aaron this in the land of Egypt:

<sup>2</sup>This month is to be the beginning of your calendar. It is to be the first month of the year for you. <sup>3</sup>Tell the entire Israelite community that on the tenth day of this month, they are to take a lamb or a kid goat for themselves, according to their fathers' households, one lamb per household. <sup>4</sup>But if the household is too small for a whole lamb, then that person and his neighbor next door to him must select one, based on the number of people. Whatever remains until the morning, you shall burn in the fire. <sup>11</sup>This is how you are to eat it: with your cloak tucked into your

belt ready for travel, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. Eat it in haste. It is the LORD's Passover.

<sup>12</sup>For on that night I will pass through the land of Egypt. I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both people and animals. Against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment. I am the LORD. <sup>13</sup>The blood will be a sign for you on the houses where you are. When I see the blood, I will pass over you. There will be no plague among you to destroy you, when I strike down the land of Egypt.

<sup>14</sup>This day shall be a memorial for you, and you are to celebrate it as a festival to the LORD. Throughout your generations you must celebrate it as a permanent regulation.

## **Epistle / Second Reading**

#### Hebrews 9:11-22

<sup>11</sup>But when Christ appeared as the high priest of the good things that were coming, he went through the greater and more complete tent, which was not made by human hands (that is, it is not part of this creation). <sup>12</sup>He entered once into the Most Holy Place and obtained eternal redemption, not by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood. <sup>13</sup>Now if the blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer, sprinkled on those who were unclean, sanctifies them so that their flesh is clean, <sup>14</sup>how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works, so that we worship the living God?

<sup>15</sup>For this reason, he is the mediator of a new covenant. A death took place as payment for the trespasses committed under the first covenant, so that those who are called would receive the promised eternal inheritance. <sup>16</sup>For where a will exists, it is necessary to establish the death of the one who made the will. <sup>17</sup>For a will takes effect at the time of death, since it is never in force when the one who made the will is still living.

<sup>5</sup>but it was because of our rebellion that he was pierced.

He was crushed for the guilt our sins deserved.

The punishment that brought us peace was upon him,

and by his wounds we are healed.

<sup>6</sup>We all have gone astray like sheep.

Each of us has turned to his own way,

but the LORD has charged all our guilt to him.

<sup>7</sup>He was oppressed, and he was afflicted,

yet he did not open his mouth.

Like a lamb he was led to the slaughter,

and like a sheep that is silent in front of its shearers,

he did not open his mouth.

<sup>8</sup>He was taken away without a fair trial and without justice,

and of his generation, who even cared?

So, he was cut off from the land of the living.

He was struck because of the rebellion of my people.

<sup>9</sup>They would have assigned him a grave with the wicked,

but he was given a grave with the rich in his death,

because he had done no violence,

and no deceit was in his mouth.

<sup>10</sup>Yet it was the LORD's will to crush him

and to allow him to suffer.

Because you made his life a guilt offering, he will see offspring.

He will prolong his days,

and the LORD's gracious plan will succeed in his hand.

<sup>11</sup>After his soul experiences anguish, he will see the light of life.

He will provide satisfaction.

Through their knowledge of him, my just servant will justify the many,

for he himself carried their guilt.

<sup>12</sup>Therefore I will give him an allotment among the great,

and with the strong he will share plunder,

because he poured out his life to death,

and he let himself be counted with rebellious sinners.

He himself carried the sin of many,

and he intercedes for the rebels.

## Epistle / Second Reading

Hebrews 4:14-16, 5:7-9

<sup>14</sup>Therefore, since we have a great high priest, who has gone through the heavens, namely, Jesus the Son of God, let us continue to hold on to our confession. <sup>15</sup>For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are, yet without sin. <sup>16</sup>So let us approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

<sup>5:7</sup>In the days of his flesh, he offered prayers and pleas with loud cries and tears to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverence. <sup>8</sup>Although he was the Son, he learned obedience from the things he suffered. <sup>9</sup>After he was brought to his goal, he became the source of eternal salvation for everyone who obeys him, <sup>10</sup>because he was designated by God as a high priest, like Melchizedek.

## **Holy Gospel**

#### John 18:1-19:42

After saying these things, Jesus went out with his disciples across the Kidron Valley, where there was a garden. He and his disciples went into it.

<sup>2</sup>Now Judas, who was betraying him, also knew the place, because Jesus often met there with his disciples. <sup>3</sup>So Judas took the company of soldiers and some guards from the chief priests and the Pharisees, and came there with lanterns, torches, and weapons.

<sup>4</sup>Jesus, knowing everything that was going to happen to him, went out and asked them, "Who are you looking for?"

<sup>5</sup>"Jesus the Nazarene," they replied.

"I am he," Jesus told them.

Judas, the betrayer, was standing with them. <sup>6</sup>When Jesus told them, "I am he," they backed away and fell to the ground.

<sup>7</sup>Then Jesus asked them again, "Who are you looking for?"

"Jesus the Nazarene," they said.

<sup>8</sup>"I told you that I am he," Jesus replied. "So if you are looking for me, let these men go." <sup>9</sup>This was to fulfill the statement he had spoken: "I did not lose any of those you have given me."

<sup>10</sup>Then Simon Peter, who had a sword, drew it, struck the high priest's servant, and cut off his right ear. The servant's name was Malchus.

<sup>11</sup>So Jesus said to Peter, "Put your sword into its sheath. Shall I not drink the cup my Father has given me?"

<sup>12</sup>Then the company of soldiers, their commander, and the Jewish guards arrested Jesus and bound him. <sup>13</sup>First they led him to Annas, because he was father-in-law to Caiaphas, who was the high priest that year. <sup>14</sup>Now it was Caiaphas who had advised the Jews, "It is better that one man die for the people."

<sup>15</sup>Simon Peter and another disciple kept following Jesus. That disciple was known to the high priest, so he went into the high priest's courtyard with Jesus. <sup>16</sup>But Peter stood outside by the door. So the other disciple, the one known to the high priest, went out and talked to the girl watching the door and brought Peter in.

<sup>17</sup>"You are not one of this man's disciples too, are you?" the girl at the door asked Peter.

"I am not!" he said.

<sup>18</sup>The servants and guards were standing around a fire of coals that they had made because it was cold. While they warmed themselves, Peter was standing with them, warming himself too.

<sup>19</sup>The high priest questioned Jesus about his disciples and his teaching.

<sup>20</sup>Jesus answered him, "I have spoken openly to the world. I always taught in a synagogue or at the temple, where all the Jews gather. I said nothing in secret. <sup>21</sup>Why are you questioning me? Ask those who heard what I told them. Look, they know what I said."

<sup>22</sup>When he said this, one of the guards standing there hit Jesus in the face. "Is that how you answer the high priest?" he demanded.

<sup>23</sup>"If I said something wrong," Jesus answered, "testify about what was wrong. But if I was right, why did you hit me?"

<sup>24</sup>Then Annas sent him bound to Caiaphas the high priest.

<sup>25</sup>Simon Peter continued to stand there warming himself. So they said to him, "You are not one of his disciples too, are you?"

He denied it, saying, "I am not!"

<sup>26</sup>One of the servants of the high priest, a relative of the man whose ear Peter had cut off, said, "Didn't I see you with him in the garden?"

<sup>27</sup>Peter denied it again, and just then a rooster crowed.

<sup>28</sup>Early in the morning, the Jews led Jesus from Caiaphas to the Praetorium. They did not enter the Praetorium themselves, so that they would not become ceremonially unclean. (They wanted to be able to eat the Passover meal.) <sup>29</sup>So Pilate went out to them and said, "What charge do you bring against this man?"

<sup>30</sup>They answered him, "If this man were not a criminal, we would not have handed him over to you."

<sup>31</sup>Pilate told them, "Take him yourselves and judge him according to your law."

The Jews said, "It's not legal for us to put anyone to death." <sup>32</sup>This happened so that the statement Jesus had spoken indicating what kind of death he was going to die would be fulfilled.

<sup>33</sup>Pilate went back into the Praetorium and summoned Jesus. He asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?"

<sup>34</sup>Jesus answered, "Are you saying this on your own, or did others tell you about me?"

<sup>35</sup>Pilate answered, "Am I a Jew? Your own people and chief priests handed you over to me. What have you done?"

<sup>36</sup>Jesus replied, "My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would fight so that I would not be handed over to the Jews. But now my kingdom is not from here." You are a king then?" Pilate asked.

Jesus answered, "I am, as you say, a king. For this reason I was born, and for this reason I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

<sup>38</sup>"What is truth?" Pilate said to him.

After he said this, he went out again to the Jews and told them, "I find no basis for a charge against him. <sup>39</sup>But you have a custom that I release one prisoner to you at the Passover. So do you want me to release the King of the Jews for you?"

<sup>40</sup>Then they shouted back, "Not this man, but Barabbas!" (Now Barabbas was a rebel.)

<sup>19:1</sup>Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged. <sup>2</sup>The soldiers also twisted together a crown of thorns and placed it on his head. Then they threw a purple robe around him. <sup>3</sup>They kept coming to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" And they kept hitting him in the face.

<sup>4</sup>Pilate went outside again and said to them, "Look, I am bringing him out to you to let you know that I find no basis for a charge against him."

<sup>5</sup>So Jesus came out wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Behold the man!"

<sup>6</sup>When the chief priests and guards saw him, they shouted, "Crucify!"

Pilate told them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no basis for a charge against him."

<sup>7</sup>The Jews answered him, "We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die, because he claimed to be the Son of God."

<sup>8</sup>When Pilate heard this statement, he was even more afraid. <sup>9</sup>He went back inside the palace again and asked Jesus, "Where are you from?"

But Jesus gave him no answer.

<sup>10</sup>So Pilate asked him, "Are you not talking to me? Don't you know that I have the authority to release you or to crucify you?"

<sup>11</sup>Jesus answered, "You would have no authority over me at all if it had not been given to you from above. Therefore the one who handed me over to you has the greater sin."

<sup>12</sup>From then on Pilate tried to release Jesus. But the Jews shouted, "If you let this man go, you are no friend of Caesar! Anyone who claims to be a king opposes Caesar!"

<sup>13</sup>When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus outside. He sat down on the judge's seat at a place called the Stone Pavement, or Gabbatha in Aramaic. <sup>14</sup>It was about the sixth hour on the Preparation Day for the Passover. Pilate said to the Jews, "Here is your king!"

<sup>15</sup>They shouted, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!"

Pilate said to them, "Should I crucify your king?"

"We have no king but Caesar!" the chief priests answered.

<sup>16</sup>So then Pilate handed Jesus over to them to be crucified.

So they took Jesus away. <sup>17</sup>Carrying his own cross, he went out to what is called the Place of a Skull, which in Aramaic is called Golgotha. <sup>18</sup>There they crucified him with two others, one on each side, and Jesus in the middle.

<sup>19</sup>Pilate also had a notice written and fastened on the cross. It read, "Jesus the Nazarene, the King of the Jews."

<sup>20</sup>Many of the Jews read this notice, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and it was written in Aramaic, Latin, and Greek.

<sup>21</sup>So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but that 'this man said, "I am the King of the Jews.""

<sup>22</sup>Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

<sup>23</sup>When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier. They also took his tunic, which was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom. <sup>24</sup>So they said to one another, "Let's not tear it. Instead, let's cast lots to see who gets it." This was so that the Scripture might be fulfilled which says:

They divided my garments among them

and cast lots for my clothing.

So the soldiers did these things.

<sup>25</sup>Jesus' mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene were standing near the cross.

<sup>26</sup>When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son!" <sup>27</sup>Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother!" And from that time this disciple took her into his own home.

<sup>28</sup>After this, knowing that everything had now been finished, and to fulfill the Scripture, Jesus said, "I thirst."

<sup>29</sup>A jar full of sour wine was sitting there. So they put a sponge soaked in sour wine on a hyssop branch and held it to his mouth.

<sup>30</sup>When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished!" Then, bowing his head, he gave up his spirit.

<sup>31</sup>Since it was the Preparation Day, the Jews did not want the bodies left on the crosses over the Sabbath (because that Sabbath was a particularly important day). They asked Pilate to have the men's legs broken and the bodies taken away. <sup>32</sup>So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first man who was crucified with Jesus, and then those of the other man.

<sup>33</sup>But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. <sup>34</sup>Instead, one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear. Immediately blood and water came out. <sup>35</sup>The one who saw it has testified, and his testimony is true. He knows that he is telling the truth, so that you also may believe. <sup>36</sup>Indeed, these things happened so that the Scripture would be fulfilled, "Not one of his bones will be broken." <sup>37</sup>Again another Scripture says, "They will look at the one they pierced."

<sup>38</sup>After this, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate to let him remove Jesus' body. When Pilate gave him permission, he came and took Jesus' body away. <sup>39</sup>Nicodemus, who earlier had come to Jesus at night, also came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-two pounds.

<sup>40</sup>They took Jesus' body and bound it with linen strips along with the spices, in accord with Jewish burial customs.

<sup>41</sup>There was a garden at the place where Jesus was crucified. And in the garden was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. <sup>42</sup>So they laid Jesus there, because it was the Jewish Preparation Day, and the tomb was near.
